The Mystery of the "Tarlton Caves"

The January 14, 1888 issue of the *Democratic Watchman* printed a report from a local surveyor who claimed to have explored a massive cave system on private land near the village of Tarlton. The paper claimed it to be "the greatest natural curiosity ever found on earth."

The surveyor described a cave system with several chambers likening it to the Mammoth Caves located in Kentucky.

Here's where the story becomes even more intriguing. The article implied that the cave system showed evidence of human habitation. Among his discoveries were four oil wells, seven gas wells, as well as mineral and lead deposits with evidence of mining (by Native Americans?). Most alarming was his claim of discovering a chamber with four petrified human bodies surrounded by crystals. He asserted the bodies were over 7 and 9 feet tall.

So, do (or did) these caves really exist? The surveyor provided plenty of details but neglected to give out specifics including location.

Does anyone out there have any clues? The caves are considered 'lost' but may be nothing more than a local hoax.

On occasion the Library receives private photo collections with no identifying information included. These pictures may include people and places of historical significance. If you have long-standing knowledge of Pickaway County, a nice way to spend an afternoon would be to help us go through our collection and assist us in putting a name to a face or a description to a place or event.
